Who is the effective teacher?

They clearly embody the rich complexity of teaching as expressed in Ayer's definition:

"instructing, advising, counseling, organizing, assessing, guiding, goading, showing, managing, modeling, coaching, disciplining, prodding, preaching, persuading, proselytizing, listening, interacting, nursing, and inspiring."

All 10 traits occur on a continuum; no teacher is uniformly strong in every trait.

## Gilbert Highet (1975) wisely observed,

"When I started teaching, I thought it would become easier as I went along. Now I know it does not. In one way, teaching as a profession is scarcely comparable to medicine or the church. After twenty years' experience, a doctor knows an enlarged spleen when he feels one, and a priest or minister knows what to say to a mourner or a sinner; but the average teacher has no such thorough grasp of his craft, because it is constantly changing and he himself must change with it."
